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From the Principal

Dr Paul Rijken

Dear friends of Cardijn College,

Welcome to another edition of INSPIRED! Each year brings a new challenge for Cardijn. Last year it was the global pandemic and how we navigated the uncertainty and COVID-19 restrictions. We were well-prepared for this ongoing challenge in 2021 and made the most of the year. We were delighted to come through 2021 with all our key student events we have come to enjoy over many years as a Cardijn tradition. The school Sports Day, Athon Day, retreats, camps and the important Tenison - Cardijn exchange - some of these events you will well remember. One aspect of our school life which had to be modified were large gatherings such as school assemblies, parent gatherings and community events. I hope that restrictions will ease for next year so that we can again gather as a community and celebrate our school life.

Cardijn College continues to grow each year. This year Galilee Catholic School officially transitioned to become Cardijn College Galilee. Whilst any transition is difficult for a community, the Galilee community made 2021 an extraordinary success. Year 7 students joined as our first secondary school class in the middle school at Galilee, a new masterplan was developed and land adjacent to the campus was purchased to accommodate our expansion. Cardijn branding was introduced, and middle school students wore the Cardijn uniform. Students from the main campus visited Galilee often to work alongside the younger students in the classrooms or support the sports program. Stage 1 of the building program has commenced which will see a significant building on the corner of How and Quinliven Roads. This building, to be completed next year, will accommodate our middle school students. We are very excited about the growth of Cardijn College in the Aldinga region and look forward to another exciting year in 2022.

Across at our Marcellin campus, we continue to be extremely proud of our students. In 2021, over 85% of our graduates moved into employment either through an apprenticeship, traineeship, or full-time work. Our students achieved 100% SACE completion and along with their nationally accredited training certificates, students are well-placed for their future.

There are more apprenticeships in the industry than we have students, so our ongoing challenge is to encourage students to look at vocational pathways. Our Marcellin campus is back to full capacity and in 2022 we have the largest student intake, with all classes filled from Year 10-12. Families value the Marcellin experience, students are well prepared to tackle the world of work, supported by teachers and trainers who understand the importance of developing those personal qualities such as communication, initiative, teamwork, resilience, ethics as well as loyalty and being respectful. Our industry partners are instrumental to our success, and we are grateful for their support of our program. Next year we will begin Stage 1 of our master plan which will see the development of a new engineering and automotive hub.

Life at the Noarlunga campus has been rich and full. One area is that we have grown significantly in student numbers from about 800 to over 1400 students. In the middle school, we have increased from seven classes per year level to 10 classes with an annual intake of more than 280 students per year level. Simply put, Cardijn College, Noarlunga Downs is at full capacity. For this reason, Cardijn College is in discussions with the State Government to purchase the land between Cardijn and the South Adelaide Football Club. An announcement will be made early in 2022. This land will become the location of a dedicated senior school and new sports centre. We are delighted with the near completion of our Centre of Excellence in Creativity and Innovation, which will also

accommodate our Year 12 students. This will complete our Student Central area and you will see the transformation when you visit us next. Our main oval will undergo a major upgrade next year with the installation of lights, a scoreboard and shelter. I am sure this will be welcomed by everyone in the community.

We are delighted to have hosted the reunions of the classes of 1990, 2000 and 2010 which were not able to be held last year and the classes of 1991, 2001 and 2011. Thank you to all old scholars for remaining connected with Cardijn - your support is greatly appreciated and valued. Next year we will host an event for all Old Scholars at the Noarlunga Downs campus, to celebrate the completion of our building project, for you to see the new Cardijn and also officially launch our "Cardijn College Anniversary Book".

I am very excited to see you in 2022 and to welcome you back to your alma mater. We are very proud of you as a graduate of the school and look forward to sharing the life of Cardijn.

A New House is Born

2022 will mark a new era in the history of Cardijn College. We will welcome the establishment of our 8th House, Chavoin (*pronounced chav-waan*), named after Jeanne-Marie Chavoin. The new House colour will be a deep pink, chosen to honour our Marist connection.

“Next year will bring new opportunities, our new Senior School and Innovation Centre will bring something new for everyone,”

said Principal Dr Paul Rijken on announcing the new House at the 2021 Valedictory ceremony.

“From a new cafeteria, new technology, science/STEM and visual arts, design areas with access to our virtual reality and 360-degree cinema. We will bring life back to the heart of our school in our new student central area,” he said.

Despite her own personal lack of education, Chavoin valued learning highly. In her formative years, she learnt concern and compassion for others, particularly those less fortunate. Jeanne Marie founded the first community of the Marist Sisters. Her vision for the Sisters was to live a hidden life in the world, acting as apostles in the community and educating children with limited opportunities.

The Marist Sisters in Australia brought a Marist education to young women in Sydney in 1909. As our new House patron Chavoin connects us with “Being Marist” and an understanding of the importance of education.

Our new House Patron has been endorsed by the Cardijn College Board, received the approval of Dr Neil McGoran, Director of Catholic Education SA and endorsed by the Archbishop of Adelaide, Patrick O’Regan.

Chavoin House will be led by House Leader Mr Liam Brooks and a process was undertaken to offer students with the opportunity to join the new House and be involved in this exciting new beginning.

Students in Chavoin House will be located in the new Senior School and Innovation Centre when it opens in early 2022.

What pathway did you take after school?

I was lucky enough to spend several winter seasons away working up in Mt Buller in the Victorian Alpine Region, along with juggling several retail jobs before landing a job in digital advertising just over six years ago. The job has included a lot of travel which has taken me to most parts of Australia and New Zealand.



What have been your proudest moments & highlights since opening Heart & Whole?

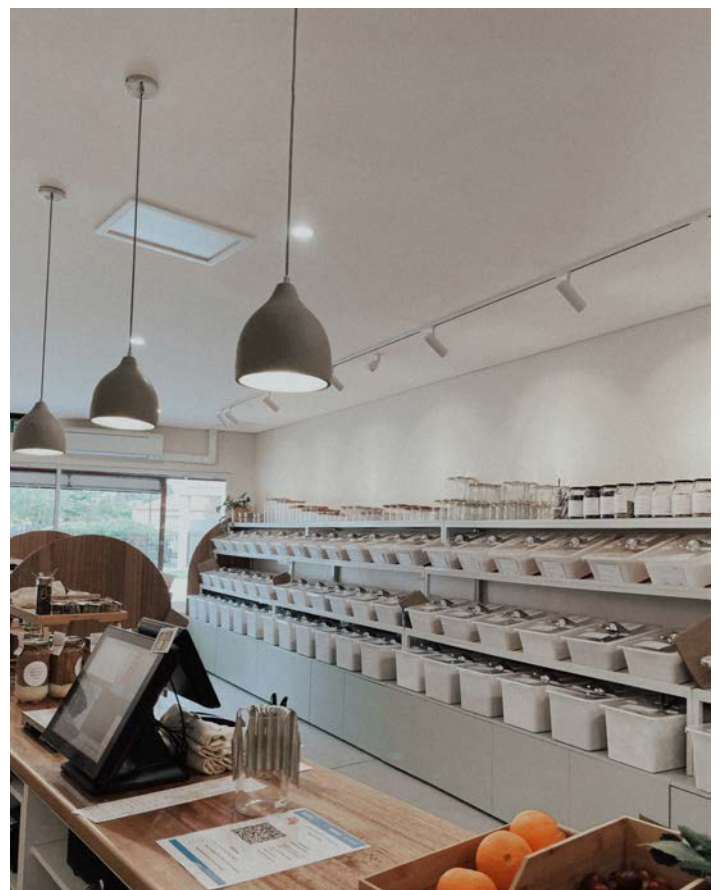

Reyes Beard ('04)

Making waves in the world of Marketing, old scholar Reyes Beard speaks to INSPIRED about her journey from Cardijn to the Melbourne Fashion Festival and back home.

Who/what do you remember most about your time at Cardijn?

The friendships that I made have endured to this day. It's a privilege to have so many friendships continue that began at Cardijn; it's amazing to see how all of our lives have turned out and the career paths we've all taken. Being able to now do business with or utilise the expertise and experiences of people that I went to school with is a wonderful thing.

What inspired your career in Marketing & Communications? How did your time at Cardijn influence you in your career and life?

I actually wanted to do fashion design but there weren't any readily available courses in that so the career counsellor suggested I look into marketing as I have always been good at relating to people. I applied to Business Marketing at TAFE and soon after got my first job in the industry and have never looked back. It's such a diverse industry with so many different branches; from the super social event and partnerships arm to the highly analytical side of advertising/social media statistics and audience targeting.



What pathway did you take after school?

I studied business marketing at TAFE and then soon after landed my first job in the industry and moved to Melbourne in 2006. It was in Melbourne that I cut my teeth in the industry of Marketing and Communications, working in Lifestyle PR which laid the foundation of the path for the rest of my career. Early on in my career I set a goal of simply being and doing better than the year before; it's the same goal I still set myself every year.

What have been your proudest moments & highlights since establishing Reyes Marketing House?

Some of the proudest moments I have had working for myself is working alongside and being peers with people that I used to look up to. I've worked on so many amazing projects but one of my favourites was being a partner of Melbourne Fashion Festival through one of my clients being a major sponsor. Going through the motions of creating a huge activation, at one of my favourite events, that was enjoyed by tens of thousands of people was a wonderful feeling. Pulling off something of that scale; working alongside national brands and names of the highest calibre as a small business owner with a small team was certainly something I'll always be proud of.

Something else that I'm immensely proud of actually only happened this year; I was accepted to an Executives Program at Oxford University Said Business School in London. I was able to learn from some of the world's biggest names in Marketing and sit alongside classmates that represented the marketing divisions of household brand names. Being a small business without corporate backing, I was very nervous when I saw the high calibre of classmates and wondered if I was perhaps out of my depth with this study. I am still pinching myself that I managed to finish the course with a High Distinction and could sit comfortably alongside people that I thought would be intimidating in their experience and knowledge.

Tell me about your experience with The Garden of Unearthly Delights & Christies Beach Business & Tourism Association.

I was fortunate to be awarded the contract for Digital Marketing Manager of the GOUD in 2017, it was a huge contract, on-top of my existing client base and one that I was so excited to be involved with. To add to the pressure, my daughter had just been born and I started working onsite at GOUD with the management team when she was just five weeks old (she was with me through every meeting, media showing and content grab). Working on iconic events are high pressure and a vortex of intense activity over a short period of time; the workload and focus needed to execute these types of events is unforgiving but the reward of seeing what you and the team have pulled off afterwards is like no other; knowing

that you've played a part in something that hundreds of thousands of people have experienced is a pretty cool feeling.

After sitting on the board for the Christies Beach Business and Tourism Association for a bit over a year, I was humbled to be nominated and voted in as Chairwoman. This was a volunteer position that I took on on-top of running my business as I wanted to be able to be a voice of change and advocate for the area which I had grown up in and love.

What advice would you give to current students about following their career dreams and ambitions?

I would say to not get to hung up on feeling like you need to decide what you need to be or a particular job that you need to get. The reality is that from high school it's impossible to know the path your career will take and many of the jobs that you'll end up doing and the tasks that will consume your day, may not even exist right now. When I started out, social media didn't even exist; it is now a fundamental part of my career and expertise. Being keen to learn through experience, trying new things and being open to where a path might lead you are far more important than your final score or the TAFE or Uni course you've done straight out of high school. As a generation that will be working under millennial CEOs and managers, they'll almost always be more interested in you as a person and your experiences (both life and career wise) than simply what your final grade was. A career is made up of so much more than the study you take or the tasks in any one job.

Any other news to share?

In 2019 I married Joe Prater on the beach in Tulum, Mexico, who I went to Cardijn with. We connected from the moment we met and remained friends through the different paths our lives took us and then brought us back into each other's lives. We are now married with a daughter and expecting twins in December.

Staff Q&A

Jarrad Strain

In this issue of INSPIRED, we chat to Maths and Innovation Curriculum leader Jarrad Strain to find out what makes him tick.

You've had an interesting and varied career path. What inspired you to pursue a teaching career?

I have had the pleasure of working across different industries and in different roles. I enjoyed many aspects of this work, however I found a real spark through volunteering with Rotary on weekends. That was when some of the most enjoyable times occurred. In particular when I was working on youth camps with Rotary that allowed me to see the impact that genuine care and positive experiences have on young people.

At one point I said to my wife that I wanted to swap the ratio of five day work week and two day volunteering with kids. She recognised my passion and pointed out that work in education may give me the best of both worlds. She was right.

Since moving into education I have found joy in working with students and satisfaction in student growth, as well as my own. I recall a key feature of successful and satisfied colleagues across all industries has been the willingness and ability to continue to learn and grow. I impart this advice on to students; with the hope that whatever they do after they graduate, they develop into life long learners.

What do you enjoy most about working at Cardijn College?

Cardijn College is such a positive community with so many opportunities arising from the growth, for students, staff and community members. Working with teachers that are so willing to support each other and the students is energising as a teacher.

I have been the benefactor of the efforts many predecessors put into the College, and I am excited by the seeds we are currently planting. I look forward to seeing how the projects and resources, particularly in the new building, we are working on now will continue to support the College and the wider community in the future.

What are your goals and priorities in your role as Maths and Innovation Curriculum Leader?

In Mathematics at Cardijn College, we are addressing anxiety around the subject and responding to relevance through recognising that Mathematics can support human flourishing. This is a process to shift mathematics from a tool to a mindset that fosters virtues. This approach aligns well with so much of the ethos at Cardijn College, and I am confident it will flow into the positive engagement and achievement of students.

Innovation has a lot of projects underway, but a priority is preparing for the implementation of the Centre for Innovation in the new building. The tools and resources this space will provide will ensure Cardijn College can continue to provide progressive educational experiences for students into the future.



Who/what inspires you in your work and life?

I am inspired by the progress and possibilities the future brings. I often think of this, the possibilities of the future in terms of the impact on our students, but now it seems even more personal with my daughters. Each of my daughters are unique in personality and strengths; Aurora (6yo) is sensitive and has an altruistic care of others, Celeste (2yo) is confident and driven and Stella (born 5 Nov) is just starting to form her relationship with the world. I am inspired to share the joys and potential of the world that they will be a part of.

What are your interests/hobbies outside of work?

While my family is my favourite hobby (which the photos on social media would demonstrate) when time permits, I find joy in fuelling my curiosity. I enjoy exploring technology through tinkering with Arduinos, Raspberry Pis, rockets and FPV drones. I also enjoy reading books, doing puzzles and exploring mathematical objects (such as origami and Rubiks cubes).

A hobby that I look forward to getting back into, as my daughters grow up, is space. I am fascinated by space travel, with some very fond memories visiting the Apollo 11 launch site and getting tours of decommissioned space shuttles. Even the opportunity to gaze at the stars and consider the immensity of space stokes my imagination and excites me.



Old Collegians Sport

2021 proved to be a year of character building for Cardijn Old Collegians FC. Coming off the back of a somewhat disappointing 2020 with the effects of COVID-19 and a string of undesirable results that led to our first team being relegated from Division 1, the Old Collegians looked to regather their strength. This strength was challenged at times through injuries and poor results, but ultimately the club finished strong and will look to bring this resolve into 2022.

The 2021 season initially looked to be a return to form for the Old Collegians, particularly in the first team side. Indicative of this was a new first team coach who immediately showed his passion and commitment to making the club successful on-field performers. This, combined with strong new and returning first team players, looked to indicate a possible return to Division 1. However, an incredibly unfortunate string of injuries to the first team left the team somewhat lost, negatively impacting both the first team and reserves as a result. Thus, the first team struggled to put results on the board in the first half of the season. However, through the commitment and resilience of both the coach and the players, the first team was able to turn around the second half of the season, posting some very strong results that indicate a much stronger 2022.

The reserves and C grade had a similar trajectory to the first team throughout 2021. In terms of the reserves team, they were able to achieve more stability week-in-week-out but still struggled to put wins on the board despite many close results. However, they showed great promise throughout and only looked stronger as the season went on. Overall, quite a strong performance from the Bs side who have proven to be our most consistent side over the years. The C grade team had a very strong pre-season and were looking to make a statement in Division 5 this year, but the results again failed to show this to an extent. With that said, the Cs team began to gel toward the end of the year and in patches played some football that was fluid, effective and great to watch. Both teams will look to build on this improving form into 2022 and be rewarded with positive results.

Cardijn Old Collegians FC is aiming for a strong year in 2022, both in terms of on-field performance and providing a social culture that is inclusive and fun for all members. To achieve this, we have picked a dedicated committee, revamped the coaching line-up and put a huge focus on creating an environment that is conducive to both on-field and social success. 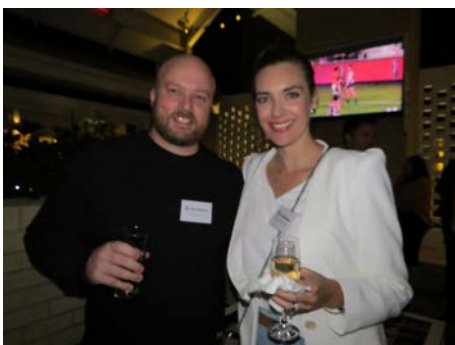

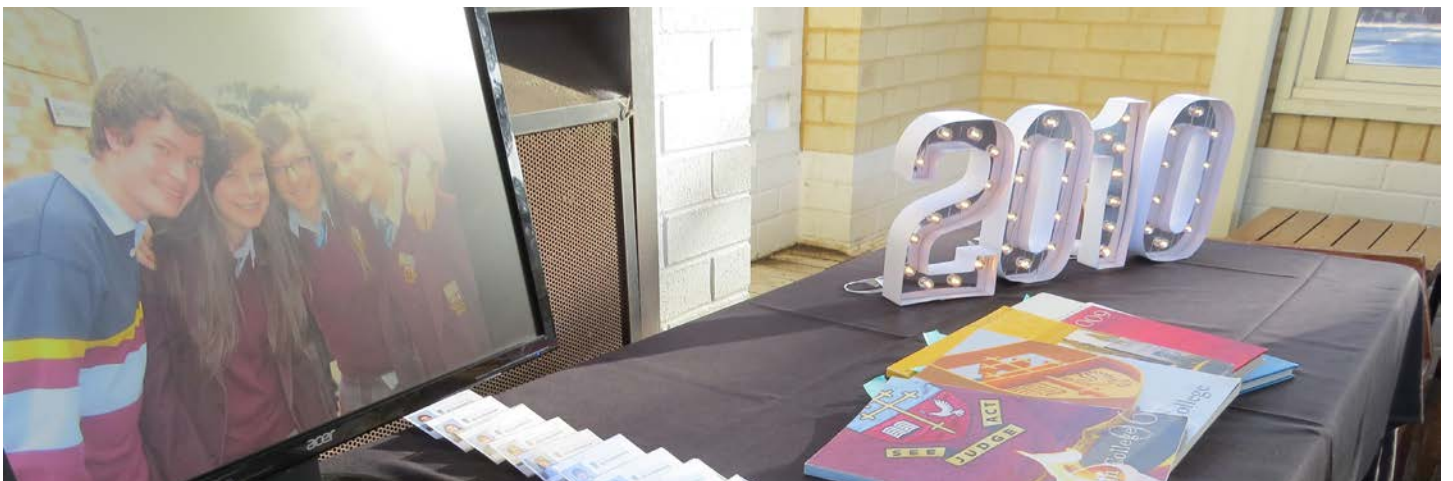
