



Jenna Hudson Class of '15

In this issue of INSPIRED, we chat to 2015 Drama Captain Jenna Hudson about her journey from performing at Cardijn to The Voice Australia, building a 1.5M-strong TikTok following, and using her platform to promote self-love and authenticity. Jenna discusses how personal challenges fuelled her passion for music, the experience of performing on a national stage, and offers advice for young people pursuing their own dreams.



What sparked your love for music?

I feel like I always loved being in the spotlight when I was younger. Putting on little performances for my friends and family was something I loved to do. But I really got into music deeper when I lost my dad. I would just play piano and sing every single day. I think I was about 15. I just didn't really know what else to do, but it made me feel good, so I did it a lot.


Then, when I met my fiancé Yorke, he encouraged me to start busking and doing local gigs in Adelaide. He really helped grow my confidence to potentially take music more seriously.

Are there any memories from Cardijn that played a role in inspiring your creativity or confidence?

So many! I was Drama Captain in 2015. Cardijn became a real safe space for me, especially in music class and drama where I just felt like I could totally be myself. I specifically remember singing at the Year 9 assembly. It was one of the first times I'd really performed, and at the time, we probably had 700 students there. To me, it was such a big deal. Honestly, throughout my whole Cardijn experience, I was given a lot of opportunities to perform and sing. Being Drama Captain on top of that is so funny and iconic.

What drew you to audition for The Voice Australia, and how did you feel stepping onto such a big stage?

Oh my gosh, that whole experience is just insane. So, the whole audition process is huge, it's so much bigger than people know, unless you've gone through the experience. There's probably three or four months of pre-auditions before you get to The Voice blind audition stage.



It all started when someone approached Yorke on social media asking if he wanted to audition. He's already got music on Spotify, so he's established in music as a career. One of the producers found his music and they were like, "Yeah, you should audition." So, I went along with him to the very, very, very first audition, just as moral support, but because I have a following on social media already, people were recognising me a little

bit there, being like, "Oh my god, Jenna, don't you sing as well?" And I was like, "I do a little bit, but I'm trying to make this about Yorke. I want Yorke to have his moment in the spotlight, he's so talented." One of the producers recognised me and asked Yorke if I'd be interested to come and audition as well, and he was like, "Yes, she would." So I came in and I was honestly, yeah, I was honestly not expecting it at all, and I hadn't rehearsed, but they got





me into audition, and yeah, there was so many different stages, and we just kept getting through the stages. Then we were told we were getting a blind audition in front of Guy Sebastian, Kate Miller-Heidke, LeAnn Rimes, and Adam Lambert, like, "What the hell?"

One of the most crazy days in my whole life just having that opportunity, I'd watched The Voice since I was a kid, so getting to go out on stage, in front of a live studio audience, the whole of Australia, celebrity judges, my own family, Yorke's there on stage too, and then they all turned! I was like, "What??" I was pretty confident I could turn one chair, because I did think I've got a bit of raw talent, but I wasn't sure how good the talent was, but apparently, it's good enough for four chairs! That's now my Instagram and TikTok bio for life.

How did being on the show challenge or grow you as a performer?

I wasn't on the show for as long as some people, obviously got knocked out by the old fiancé, but I do think that for the time I was on

the show, being around all those other insanely talented singers, they pushed me to hear things like you haven't heard before because everyone has their own unique style. And essentially, we were hand-picked, like 40 of the best singers in the whole of Australia, at that time. So just being around all those other singers, made my brain sort of click and think, "Oh my god, yeah, I can sing it like that" or "I can just try doing these new things too." That helped my voice and made me such a better singer. And getting singing tips from my Coach Kate Miller-Heidke was so amazing. The feedback she gave me, I still think about, it's permanently in my brain now.

How did you start building your TikTok platform, and what inspired you to create content there?

During Covid, when I lost my job via email, I said to Yorke, "I don't know what I want to do now." He had downloaded TikTok and said you should download it too, it's really funny, like you can just

watch funny videos and it's very entertaining. So I downloaded the app. And quickly realised, oh, like I could make videos too, and wouldn't that be funny? So, I just started making videos, and within the first month, I gained 50,000 followers and had multiple viral videos. And I said, "Imagine one day when I have a million followers, that could change my life!" And now I have 1.5M followers.



What's your approach to connecting with your audience on TikTok, and how do you keep your content authentic?

That's a huge one for me because I love to see myself on my social media as someone who tries to be a positive role model. I think social media is really vain, and a lot of what gets appreciated on social media is beauty standards and putting pressure on women to conform to maybe something they're not. I try my best in my videos, whether it be a giveaway video or a video where I'm talking about periods, I try to just be authentic and be silly with it. I really love that I can connect with young girls and help them feel more confident about being themselves.

What role has TikTok played in expanding your career opportunities or reaching new audiences?

I don't think people realise being an influencer means I run a business, and I have to do all those boring business things as well. All the taxes, all the chasing up invoices, and it's been amazing using social media because that's how everyone finds me. You have access to everyone in the world. I've worked with companies that are international, and being able to have the access is just so much freedom. And I feel like social media isn't always cast in the best light, but you can really use it to get what you want.

Do you have any exciting projects or collaborations in the works that you can share with us?

Yes! I'm always working on stuff. I am working on music, which is very exciting. I really want to release some songs that can be anthems, the same as my videos are about self-love and how to be yourself and how to feel good. So that will be coming, hopefully, at the beginning of next year. I want to keep doing events, I do

modelling workshops, and I also want to be getting back into schools and chatting to people hands-on about body image.

How do you envision the next few years of your career in music and content creation?

Coming up to the end of the year, I've been thinking about this a lot. I've found what's worked well for me over the years is trusting my gut and going with the flow. My life is nuts, I get to travel, I get to attend red carpets, I get to just dress up and feel like a beauty queen, and I get to connect with all my fans and followers. I'm so go with the flow, and we'll see what happens, but I think what I'm trying to manifest is more opportunities to connect with young girls around the world.

What advice would you give to current Cardijn students who dream of pursuing a career in music or digital content?

Firstly, I just think dreaming big is so important. Also, finding people



that you can emulate, finding role models that are doing exactly what you want to be doing. Find people that are living your dream life and figure out how I can do what they're doing to get to where they are. I feel like these days with the internet, there's so much information.

It can sometimes get a little bit like, oh my God, it's too much information. But I've definitely found through watching people that I admire and following the sorts of steps that they take in their business, if that is what you want, to work in modern-day marketing.

You know, getting an internship, just taking those small steps to reach your dream goal. I feel like I started working on my dream when I was 17 doing modelling and a little bit of presenting work. So I would just say like now is a perfect time to start taking those small little steps and you keep your dreams big, baby, because even if you don't get to the biggest, biggest dream, like you might get 3/4 of the way there, and then that's pretty damn good.





From navigating the muddy grounds of a budding Cardijn College to tending the lush vineyards of McLaren Vale, Corinna Wright has always embraced both tradition and transformation. As the sixth generation of the Oliver family to steward the historic Oliver's Taranga estate, Corinna has carved her own path—fusing her family's rich heritage with modern innovation in winemaking. Speaking to INSPIRED, she reflects on her formative years at Cardijn, the values that have shaped her journey, and her advice for the next generation of dreamers.

Do you have a favourite memory from your time at Cardijn?

OMG - it is sooooooo long ago now, I'm a million years old! I was in the second intake year at Cardijn, so I remember a lot of building happening and there being plenty of mud. I remember being very proud to receive both an academic & leadership award in Year 12. I think I was the lead singer for the school band for a hot minute there, but I think we only had one song -'I Saw Her Standing There' by the

Beatles. I really enjoyed the sports exchanges to Tenison, being billeted by their families and vice versa even though I was only competing in the debating team! There were some cracking footy games played between our two schools.

What values or lessons from Cardijn have stayed with you throughout your career?

'See, Judge, Act' was our school motto, and I like to think that has stayed with me throughout my

career and general life. I am not afraid to speak up and put the hard work in to make something happen. If I want something to change, I am happy to be part of the solution.

I have always loved learning, and Cardijn certainly didn't dampen that. I had some great teachers that I still respect today.

If you could give advice to current Cardijn students dreaming of a career in winemaking, what would it be?


DO IT! Winemaking straddles so many different areas - the sciences, the arts, marketing, business, travel, hospitality - it is never boring. We especially need more women in our industry - so get around it!



McLaren Vale is renowned for its wines. What makes this region special to you?

I had to spend many years away to really appreciate it - you think that the grass is always greener elsewhere! McLaren Vale is where my ancestors settled five generations before me and I always feel a sense of calm when I come back home. We are country, but not too country. We have the most incredible beaches so close. We are close to Adelaide. The food and wine scene is unparalleled. I am very thankful that my ancestors settled here in 1839, and happy to be continuing our family story.







How do you see McLaren Vale evolving in the coming years, particularly in sustainable practices?

McLaren Vale is already leading the way in sustainability. Our region developed the first sustainability program for the Australian wine industry which is now used nationwide. We were one of the first regions to tap into recycled water from the surrounding townships (the purple pipes) - ensuring both that precious ground or Murray River water was not being overused and that the recycled water that was


previously being pumped into the gulf and ruining leafy sea dragon habitat, ceased. We also have the highest proportion of organic and biodynamic vineyards in Australia.

As the sixth generation of the **Oliver family to run Oliver's** Taranga, what does continuing this legacy mean to you?

It is a huge legacy, but I feel thrilled that my generation has been able to add to it over the past 30 years. Our wine label only started in 1994 once I started winemaking, previously all the fruit from our 300-acre vineyard was sold to

other wineries. I love living on our vineyard, love working with my other family members, love my team. My husband and I have also been able to start a craft brewery on our property, Swell Brewing Co, which has been a great adventure. We were able to add a new wine contract processing facility, Oliver & Press, to our family of businesses 18 months ago, and that feels like the last piece of the puzzle perhaps for my generation. Will need to sit down for a bit of a rest sometime soon and let the next gen have a crack!





What traditions or values have been passed down through the generations that you incorporate into your work today?

Authenticity. Hard work. Taking the time for the things that matter. Building community. Success.

How do you balance honouring family heritage with bringing modern innovation to Oliver's Taranga?


The vineyard is in my DNA. I am trying to bring the expression of our vineyard to life every year in a bottle. I'm very lucky to have

such a great vineyard to work with. The winemaking method isn't particularly innovative, but I have enjoyed being at the forefront of working with new varieties to Australia such as Fiano, Mencia, Falanghina and Sagrantino. There is plenty of innovation in the business and marketing side of the business though - keeping up with selling online and social media and our wonderful, newly renovated cellar door space and the experiences that we share with customers. We have also been lucky to have a collaborative wine, **IHANA**, with Formula 1 driver and our 'cousin from the north' Valtteri

Bottas. The project has taken us to Texas, Finland, Melbourne, Azerbaijan and Singapore in just the last 18 months, and there is plenty more excitement coming on that front. *www.ihanawine.com*

Do you have a favourite story or memory about the family's connection to the vineyard?


Can't really explain how much I love this property and how lucky I feel to be able to work on it. My generation is just the next set of caretakers, looking after the property for the generations to come, adding our little bit to the Taranga vineyard story.

Looking Back

What do you think has been the most significant milestone in Cardijn's 40-year history?

There have been so many milestones over the past 40 years, and it is difficult to name one as the most significant. I think expanding to Year 7 in 2019 was significant as was amalgamating with Marcellin and Galilee but probably the most impactful over the 40 years was the introduction and subsequent expansion of the House system. I think it is this that makes Cardijn stand out from other schools. It is the House system that is the basis and foundation of our pastoral care which is so significant in our history and which is so valued by our students and families and is passed down through generations.

How has the spirit of the Cardijn community remained consistent over the years?

The deep commitment to the values of Joseph Cardijn: See, Judge, Act and the loyalty and belonging created by the House system has enabled members of the



community to remain connected to the Cardijn community. This is evident in the number of old scholars on staff and the numbers of parents who are old scholars. The connection is strong and therefore consistent.

Change and Growth

From your perspective, what are some of the biggest changes you've seen at Cardijn, both in terms of its facilities and its community?

The size and spread of the community has changed significantly as well as the

reach, as we now encompass the Aldinga area as well as having the connection to the trades through Marcellin.

Having the Galilee and Marcellin campuses has brought greater diversity as well as a significant increase in numbers of students, teachers and parents.

How has Cardijn adapted to meet the challenges of modern education over the years?

I think Cardijn has adapted by adding the technical education opportunities as well as creating opportunities on the Marian campus for vocational education courses and a greater variety of subjects in the curriculum.

What role do you think the College has played in shaping the lives of students across generations?

As evidenced by the number of past students who are now on staff as well as the past students who are now parents at the College, Cardijn has been able to connect the generations across the entire community to allow students to become teachers and parents



within the same community. I don't know that many other school communities have been able to achieve this as effectively as Cardijn.

Personal Reflections

How has your own journey been shaped by your time at Cardijn College?

As my children, and now my grandchildren, have all been or are being educated at Cardijn my experience of the community over 35 years has been very rewarding and eventful. I feel very proud of our school and the way it has answered the demands of the community over four decades while maintaining its identity as a Catholic school that is committed to the education and nurturing of the young people of the southern vales.

Is there a particular moment or story from your time at the College that stands out as especially meaningful?

I think one of the most wonderful things about being a teacher over 50 years with 35 of those years in the one school is that each year brings new challenges, new revelations, new students and staff. My years at Cardijn have been constantly inspiring and fulfilling and I feel very blessed that I am still here and able to contribute to this vibrant community.

Celebrating 40 Years

As we celebrate this milestone, what message would you like to share with the Cardijn community – past, present, and future?

Something I have learned over 50 years is that education is always changing and will continue to change. These changes will not always be for the better and some will have been tried before but there is one constant in all of this and that is the students. Our students will always need only one thing to be successful and that is, in the words of Marcellin Champagnat, 'to be loved and loved equally' If we remember this then everything else will follow and our students will know as Joseph Cardijn believed, that they are 'worth more than all the gold in the world'.

On 27 October, Cardijn welcomed families, alumni, staff, and friends for a special celebration marking our 40th anniversary. The day began with a moving commemorative Mass held in our gym, uniting past and present community members in reflection and gratitude for the four decades of growth, learning, and connection that have shaped Cardijn.

Food trucks and a charity fundraising bar offered delicious food and drinks, while our merchandise stall provided guests with a chance to show off their Cardijn spirit. Class of 2004 Reunion

"The Class of 2004 celebrated our 20-year reunion in October. It was as though time had not passed. It is incredible, you can go years without hearing a voice and yet your ears can immediately recognise it again. The night was intimate, with just a quarter of us in attendance. We all saw this as a rare opportunity to catchup one on one with one another. The conversations were honest and encouraging. Some of us have lost our biggest loves and some of us our littlest. 
























